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Closing the Insider Trading Window for Climate Events

We're talking about scenarios that are hard to predict because they existed beyond our imaginations not too long ago. You may need training yourself to become more aware of the possibilities that climate change is bringing to the fore. You might avail yourself of opportunities to be part of any climate scenario planning that your risk department undertakes. And you might just make it easy on yourself and automatically close the window if Mother Nature hits an area where you have major operations - or where a major customer or supplier has major operations. Better to be safe than sorry, even though it can be hard to inform an insider that they can't trade because of climate change. They might get mad. But they'll get over it.

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
